None of the neighbouring West Coast towns have what Paternoster has. It has an enchanting name and nobody really knows where it came from. There is something here that talks to you. Paternoster has soul. Throughout history, it has been calling people and they have gathered here, yet there is no fresh water – it's further along the coast at Varswaterbaai.

When you talk about heritage, Paternoster and heritage are really the same thing. It took the Paternoster Project to remind us of our heritage, how important it is, and how little we know about it. We need to teach our children about our heritage, so they can take pride in it. People also say Paternoster has a healing energy, and this is how we are going to heal our village, too. Paternoster is our village and it belongs to us all.

To me, the ultimate goal is to live in peace and in sync with each other – and I believe we have an excellent chance of achieving this. We are two main groupings in town – fishermen and *inkommers* – with the German presence as an objective catalyst. Their persistence has given us momentum for change and the discipline to do so; we just needed them to tell us we are ok.

Our contribution as local people of Paternoster is to work together in unity. The enemy in Paternoster is its different groupings, who all want to shine brighter than each other. Whatever we do needs to be for the greater

good of Paternoster. If it is not, it's also not welcome in the village. My motto is: 'Nothing about Paternoster, without Paternoster, is for Paternoster'. We need to forget about ourselves and think only about Paternoster, work together and we will all prosper and benefit in the end, much more than if we go it alone.

It's also important that everyone contributes to the common goal – not just with money, but with skills and time, too. Give what you can, and then we will turn Paternoster around to be an example of unity and success – not just on the West Coast, but in South Africa, even in the world. It is within our reach if we work together.

The recent Community Awards mean a lot because they were an example of people working together, and the nominations were from local people. To some people, it may be small – but in the West Coast context, it's a huge thing and shows that the West Coast is changing faster and is more united than anywhere else. Even in apartheid, we were never “apart” in Paternoster, and now we are moving even closer together. It will only get better if we continue in unity. **PP**

Stellenbosch students join the volunteers' team

In April, education students from Stellenbosch University joined the German volunteers at St Augustine's Primary School. These South African volunteers support the Afrikaans and mathematics teachers, while the German volunteers will focus on teaching English in the mornings.

Reading and writing are basic skills that children need to be able to manage their lives. However, children have different learning capabilities, which makes it difficult for teachers to serve all their needs in the classroom – so the help of the volunteers is greatly appreciated. There is also a noticeable improvement in the language skills of children who have joined Story Hook, which is part of the afternoon programme offered at the school.

The integration of South African volunteers was one of the original goals of the Paternoster Project NPC when it started in South Africa two years ago. Commitment to this goal was given by Stellenbosch University at the first Paternoster Project NPC Conference, held in October 2017, and the realisation of this goal is with thanks to Dr Bernard Rhodes, chief departmental officer, Department of Curriculum Studies, Faculty of Education. He facilitated the integration of the two current volunteers and has already selected the next group of volunteers to take over from them in July. **PP**

First German language course has finished

There was great interest in the first three-month German beginners course offered at St Augustine's Primary School. For the first lesson, children crowded onto the benches of the Grade 5 classroom. Interest was so high that some were not able to get a place on this course and will need to wait for the next opportunity.

After three months of German language tuition, which was part of the Paternoster Volunteer Project, a small but keen and highly motivated group of grades 6 and 7 children has emerged – and they are proud to show off their German language certificates.

The motivation to apply themselves to learning a foreign language during the afternoon programme stems from the children's wish to communicate with German tourists in Paternoster, and possibly to be able later to gain a foothold in the hospitality industry. Some say their dream is to one day visit the volunteers back in Germany.

The next group of grades 4 and 5 children will have the chance to take part in the German beginners course starting in July. This will bring to an end the pilot phase of the German course within the framework of the Paternoster Volunteer Project, and the Paternoster Project NPC is proud to have been able to support these children. **PP**

Paternoster Project NPC and associates honoured with community awards

Friday 13 April 2018 was a night to remember, as the people of the West Coast came together for a gala function in Saldanha to recognise and celebrate outstanding community service at the annual Community Awards, sponsored by the Saldanha Bay Municipality, Arcelor Mittal and Sea Harvest.

Awards were given in six categories: Bridging the Gap between Divided Communities, Youth, Education, Disabled, Development of Skills of Marginalised People, and Community Safety. The Paternoster Project NPC and two of its close associates swept the boards and took home first prize in three of the six award categories.

The Paternoster Project NPC won the Education category, which recognises "the educator or education institution that changes the life of a child or group of children in a unique and exceptional way". Paternoster Project NPC founder, Christian Neuber, flew to South Africa to accept the award, along with the German volunteers working at St Augustine's Primary School.

In the category Bridging the Gap between Divided Communities, local builder André Kleynhans won first prize for his ongoing dedication to the community of Paternoster. This category "recognises people or organisations that have made a difference to eliminate discrimination, barriers to equality and encourage the interaction and understanding between communities and various racial groups in an endeavour to attain reconciliation".

Local architect and also the architect for the Volunteer House currently being built in Paternoster, Heini van Niekerk, won the Youth category, which recognises "significant contribution made to improve the well-being of the youth". Heini has mentored youth and assisted with building designs for youth projects free of charge over the years. His architecture also demonstrates his innovative and creative approach to community-based initiatives.

All winners were nominated and voted for by the local community, so honouring and acknowledging the work, time and effort they have freely given to the people of the West Coast. **PP**

Meeting the needs of Paternoster's people

A needs assessment was conducted in Paternoster from 8 to 10 June, to identify the new needs of the community – as well as to note those needs that have already been met.

The assessment was conducted by Janette du Toit, director of Human Nature – a Cape Town-based company that develops ideas for socio-economic and environmental sustainability – with the help of Cindy Jacobs, team member of Human Nature, and was funded by the Paternoster Project NPC. It continues the excellent work of Paternoster Fishery, which funded the livelihoods assessment. This entailed a series of workshops with the fishing community and family members, and has resulted in many of the community's needs being met. A report on this assessment will soon be compiled and made available to the community and local businesses.

The needs assessment will also be included in the agenda of the second Paternoster Project NPC Conference, to be held later this year. The first conference was held in October 2017 and was attended by representatives from German universities, Stellenbosch University, the Western Cape Department of Education, local community businesses, entrepreneurs and educators.

Paternoster Project NPC would like to thank every community member who participated in the needs assessment. We look forward to working with the people of Paternoster to find ways to assist in meeting the community needs that they have identified. **PP**

True tales from the Story Hook

*You're never too old, too wacky, too wild,

We at Story Hook agree with Dr Seuss – and for more than a year now, both local and German volunteers have been picking up books and reading to children.

Every Thursday, when it's Story Hook time at St Augustine's Primary School, we get together in cosy little reading groups. The children rush to choose books from the Story Hook library, and the complete attention with which they listen to stories – as well as their confidence in reading aloud themselves, in both English and Afrikaans – is uplifting.

The library is growing all the time, thanks to donations of books and funds. This affords our children the opportunity to read the very latest books alongside classics.

We are also always keen to find books that will make our children aware of the privilege of growing up in a fishing village with its own rich cultural history. Books with a similar setting, such as *Ben and the Whales* or *The Herd Boy*, set in other communities in South Africa, can only broaden our children's understanding.

At Story Hook, we thrive on the thrill around books. Just recently, we had a visit from Rita van den Heever, in her heyday a popular television presenter. She held the children spellbound as she read to them, and afterwards they were keen to impress her with their reading abilities. At other times, we have held impromptu "eisteddfods", with the judges giving their comments on every "contestant". One day, German volunteer Cathy Kwiatkowski delighted the children by reading her bit in fluent Afrikaans when a group took turns in reading a story.

In recognition of the value of our efforts to spread the love of reading, Celestine Barends, principal of St Augustine's, invited Story Hook volunteers to come and read during school hours, too. Volunteers now read daily to children in grades 1 and 2.

Educare is 20 years old

For 20 years, Paternoster Educare has changed the lives of children and parents in Paternoster. The crèche facility allows parents to go to work, knowing their children are being cared for by trained professionals.

Paternoster Educare started out with just three teachers and 50 children as a day care facility in 1998. Founder Nathalie van der Heever says: "We paid R30 per week to hire the Solomon Tollman Community Hall and charged parents R25 per week. We fed the children and bathed them before they went home, so they were ready for bed. Different businesses and local people donated meat and vegetables for the children to eat, and I bought the porridge and rice. This is how we ran." Nathalie says the staff often didn't get paid, but the children had what they needed. This facility meant that parents could now work, knowing their children were safe.

The day care then became an educare, and moved to its current location alongside the community hall in 2006. Then, last year, André Kleynhans built a large facility for the newborns. "We have named it 'André se Nessie' to honour André, because he built it and gave it to us absolutely free, and it is beautiful. Next, we want to improve the grounds with a sandpit and a garden, and put new carpets in the classrooms for children to play on. We appreciate all and any contributions towards this."

Today, Paternoster Educare has 82 kids – from newborn to six years old. "We have five qualified teachers and the principal, Rachel Cloete," says Nathalie. "Each class also has a volunteer helper, and there is a cook to prepare children's meals. He/she works for five days a week but is only paid for two days, as that's what our funding allows."

It has been quite a journey for the past 20 years, but it has all been worth it, says Nathalie, even though funding is always top of mind. "I often have to pay for things from my personal household budget, and we also have to raise funds every year to pay our accountant," she says. "But we do it for the children, because then their parents can work and support their families."

From the original day care facility, Nathalie says most of the kids matriculated, three are fishermen, and many have gone to university and college. Today, some of their kids are now attending Paternoster Educare – and so the circle of life continues. **PP**

Children get free eye tests

Paternoster Fishery and the Paternoster Volunteer Project, in association with Occuvision, have launched a project at St Augustine's Primary School to test the children's eyes.

Occuvision's Geo Nel will conduct the eye tests. He has already tested all the Grade 2 learners, and the subsequent grades will follow.

Where possible, learners who need them will receive a free pair of glasses to ensure they are equipped to focus properly on their schoolwork. This project will be ongoing, and eye tests will be conducted annually to ensure optimal eye health for learners.

Educating Paternoster's kids on local heritage

Adventurer Dean Swart is walking the entire coastline of South African and Mozambique – nearly 6 000 km – to raise awareness of marine conservation and pollution. His journey started in Alexander Bay, on the border with Namibia, on 31 January, and he plans to walk for the next two years. En route, Swart talks at schools and to people about their local heritage and the importance of marine protection and conservation.

While in Paternoster in March, already having walked 640 km completely unsupported, Swart spoke to over 200 pupils at St Augustine's Primary School and explained their role in keeping the marine environment free of pollution. "I would like my journey to inspire," he said. "Even if I get the message to just a handful of people, it will be worth it. The coastline and marine life is our heritage and needs to be protected."

Self-funded and carrying just a small backpack, Swart walks an average of 20 km per day and says: "I want children and adults to start talking about marine conservation and pollution. It is an important part of our future." Swart also thanked the people of Paternoster for their hospitality and the generosity shown to him.

The rise of Volunteer House

Once it is completed, Volunteer House will reflect the heritage and surroundings of Paternoster. Architect Heini van Niekerk explains how he incorporated these aspects into the design of the house, as the village watches its progress in anticipation.

How did the design of the house evolve?

The spaces evolved as we got feedback from various workshops and the community. This resulted in the inclusion of a community coffee shop, a community boardroom, teacher administration spaces, educational equipment storage areas and public ablution areas, as well as the private living areas and private bedrooms. There are also quiet corners for reflection.

How does it reflect local heritage, materials and culture?

As a local architect, I decided to research historic photographs from archives dating back more than 110 years. A lost gable form, normally associated with thatched mansard roofs and true to our local heritage in Paternoster, was discovered. This different form of gable was incorporated into the design as a tribute to our lost architectural heritage.

Another finding was that buildings were placed closely together, resulting in small alleys between the buildings and gable forms. This feature was also incorporated. Built with local stone, the house will blend into its landscape with the large chimneys, thatched roofs and white walls of the Paternoster culture.

What is unique about the project team of the Volunteer House?

There is extraordinary commitment from everyone involved. The local element of the team has long been passionate about the area and social progress, despite intrinsic challenges. Now, with the international element, this amazing team believes their endeavours will have a great positive impact on realising the futures of Paternoster's children.

What are some of the architectural challenges regarding the house?

The main challenges were the site's heavily sloped topography, the limited roof heights and the existing rock formations. These all posed significant design and budgetary challenges, along with deep earthworks, soil stability and surface drainage issues – but all were overcome. The adjacent dwelling and the fishermen's lookout hillock (which I remember from my childhood) also posed certain constraints.

How do you envisage the house being lived in?

The house consists of public, semi-private and private zones. The deeper one goes into the building, the more defined yet less controlled the user space becomes. The floor plan integrates seamlessly with the external landscaping to mutually enhance these environments.

Are you surprised at all the attention the house is getting?

Initially, yes, but upon reflection it makes perfect sense. When things get done for the right reasons, people come together as a testament towards human integrity and character.

Do you only work locally?

Yes, as it allows less chance of things being "lost in translation". I went to school in Vredenburg and studied architecture in Cape Town and London, before returning to the West Coast.

How is the house personal to you?

Architecture becomes great when one truly understands the human condition in its totality. However, it becomes more personal when the end results of a passionate team's ambition actually make a significant difference to the lives of others in terms of social progression, and as an investment in the future of the world.

What is special for you about working on the West Coast?

We live in a most picturesque natural environment with our unique West Coast culture, ethics and history. The straight-talking and down-to-earth people bring it all together. **PP**

Geen ander Weskusdorp kan met Paternoster vergelyk word nie. Dit het 'n bekoorlike naam en niemand weet werklik waar dit vandaan kom nie. Daar is iets hier wat tot 'n mens spreek. Paternoster het siel. Deur die geskiedenis het Paternoster mense geroep en hulle het hier bymekaargekom, al is daar geen vars water nie – dit is verder langs die kus af van Varswaterbaai.

Wanneer jy van erfenis praat, is Paternoster en erfenis eintlik een en dieselfde ding. Dit was die Paternoster Project wat ons aan ons erfenis kom herinner het – oor hoe belangrik dit is en hoe min ons daarvan weet. Ons kinders moet van ons erfenis leer sodat hulle kan trots wees daarop. Mense sê ook Paternoster het geneeskrag, en dit is hoe ons ons dorp gaan genees. Paternoster is ons dorp en dit behoort aan almal van ons.

Vir my is die uiteindelike doel om in vrede en in voeling met mekaar saam te leef – en ek glo ons het 'n uitstekende kans om dit te bereik. Daar is hoofsaaklik twee groepe in die dorp – vissermanne en inkommers – met die Duitse teenwoordigheid as 'n objektiewe katalisator. Hulle volharding het vir ons momentum en dissipline vir verandering gegee; ons het hulle net nodig gehad om vir ons te kom sê dat ons eintlik oukei is.

Ons, as inwoners van Paternoster, se bydrae is om as 'n eenheid saam te werk. Die vyand in Paternoster is die verskillende groepe wat almal helderder as die res wil skyn. Wat ons ook al doen, moet tot die voordeel van Paternoster wees. As dit nie is nie, is dit nie welkom in die dorp nie. My

motto is: Niks omtrent Paternoster sonder Paternoster is vir Paternoster nie. Ons moet van onsself vergeet en net aan Paternoster dink en saamwerk. Sodoende sal ons almal floreer en voordeel trek; meer as wat ons sou as ons dit alleen gedoen het.

Dit is ook belangrik dat almal bydra tot die gemeenskaplike doel – nie net met geld nie, maar ook met vaardighede en tyd. Gee wat jy kan sodat Paternoster handomkeer kan verander en 'n voorbeeld van eenheid en sukses kan word – nie net op die Weskus nie, maar in Suid-Afrika en selfs die res van die wêreld. Dit is binne ons bereik as ons almal saamwerk.

Die onlangse gemeenskapstoekennings het baie beteken, omdat dit 'n voorbeeld was van mense wat saamgewerk het. Vir party mag dit dalk klein lyk, maar in die Weskus-konteks is dit 'n groot ding en dit wys dat die Weskus vinniger verander en meer verenig is as enige ander plek. In Paternoster was ons selfs tydens apartheid nooit "apart" nie. Nou beweeg ons selfs nog nader aan mekaar. Dit kan nog beter word as ons as 'n eenheid vorentoe beweeg. **PP**

Studente van Stellenbosch sluit by die vrywilligerspan aan

In April het opvoedkundestudente van die Universiteit Stellenbosch by die Duitse vrywilligers, wat werksaam is by St Augustine's Primère Skool, aangesluit. Die Suid-Afrikaanse vrywilligers ondersteun die Afrikaans- en wiskundeonderwysers, terwyl die Duitse vrywilligers in dieoggende Engels aanbied.

Om te lees en skryf is basiese vaardighede wat kinders nodig het om oor die weg te kom. Kinders het egter verskillende akademiese vermoëns, wat dit vir onderwysers moeilik maak om aan almal in die klas se behoeftes te voldoen. Daarom word die vrywilligers se hulp hoog op prys gestel. Daar is ook 'n merkbare verbetering in die taalvaardighede van die kinders wat by die Story Hook (deel van die namiddagprogram by die skool) aangesluit het.

Die integrasie van Suid-Afrikaanse vrywilligers was een van die oorspronklike doelstellings van die Paternoster Project NPC toe dit twee jaar gelede gestig is. Die Universiteit Stellenbosch het by die eerste Paternoster Project NPC-konferensie in Oktober 2017 onderneem om betrokke te raak by die projek en danksy Dr Bernard Rhodes, Hoof Departemente Beample van die Departement Kurrikulumstudies in die Fakulteit Opvoedkunde, is die doel bereik. Hy het die integrasie van die twee huidige vrywilligers gefasiliteer en het reeds die volgende groep vrywilligers, wat in Julie gaan kom aflos, geïdentifiseer. PP

Eerste Duitse taalkursus kom tot 'n einde

Daar was groot belangstelling in die eerste drie-maand Duitse beginnerskursus wat by St Augustine's Primère Skool aangebied is. Voor die eerste les het kinders in die graad 5-klaskamer ingestroom om 'n sitplek te kry. Die belangstelling was so groot dat sommige kinders weggewys moes word en moet wag vir die volgende geleentheid.

Na drie maande se Duitse taallesse, wat deel was van die Paternoster Volunteer Project, het 'n klein, maar hoogs gemotiveerde, groep graad 6- en 7-leerders verrys – en hulle spog trots met hul Duitse taalsertifikate.

Hulle motivering om hulself in 'n tweede addisionele taal te bekwaam tydens die namiddagprogram, spruit uit die kinders se begeerte om met Duitse toeriste in Paternoster te kan kommunikeer en ook om later 'n voet in die deur van die gasvryheidsbedryf te kry. Van die kinders droom daarvan om eendag die vrywilligers in Duitsland te gaan besoek.

Die volgende groep graad 4- en 5-leerders sal in Julie die kans kry om die Duitse beginnerskursus te voltooi. Daarna sal hierdie loofsfase van die Duitse kursus binne die raamwerk van die Paternoster Volunteer Project tot 'n einde loop, en die Paternoster Project NPC is trots daarop dat ons hierdie kinders kon ondersteun. **PP**

Paternoster Project NPC en vennote met gemeenskapstoekennings vereer

Die aand van Vrydag 13 April 2018 was een om te onthou. Inwoners van die Weskus het in Saldanha byeengekom tydens 'n gala-funksie waar uitstaande gemeenskapsdiens erken en gevier is. Die gemeenskapstoekennings is geborg deur die Saldanhabaai-munisipaliteit, Arcelor Mittal en Sea Harvest.

Pryse is in ses kategorieë toegeken: Oorbrugging van verdeelde gemeenskappe, Jeug, Onderrig, Gestremdhede, Ontwikkeling van vaardighede onder gemarginaliseerde mense en Gemeenskapsveiligheid. Die Paternoster Project NPC en twee van sy vennote het skoonskip gemaak en het drie van die ses kategorieë gewen.

Die Paternoster Project NPC het die Onderrig-kategorie gewen, wat erkenning gee aan 'n opvoeder of onderwysinstelling wat die lewe van 'n kind of groep kinders op 'n unieke en besondere wyse verander. Paternoster Project NPC se stigter, Christian Neuber, het Suid-Afrika toe gevlieg om saam met die Duitse vrywilligers wat by St Augustine's Primière Skool werkzaam is, die toekenning te ontvang.

In die kategorie Oorbrugging van verdeelde gemeenskappe, het André Kleynhans die eerste prys gewen vir sy volgehoudende toewyding aan die gemeenskap van Paternoster. Hierdie kategorie gee erkenning aan mense of organisasies wat 'n verskil gemaak het in die proses om diskriminasie en ongelijkheid uit die weg te ruim en die interaksie en verstandhouding tussen gemeenskappe en rassegroepe aanmoedig in 'n poging om versoening te vind.

Heini van Niekerk, die plaaslike argitek wat ook die argitek is van die vrywilligershuis wat tans in Paternoster in aanbou is, het die Jeug-kategorie gewen. Dié kategorie erken 'n betekenisvolle bydrae tot die verbetering van die jeug se welstand. Heini het deur die jare as mentor vir die jeug gedien en sonder vergoeding gehelp met die ontwerp van geboue vir jeugprojekte. Sy argitektuur demonstreer ook sy vernuwende en kreatiewe benadering tot gemeenskapsgebaseerde inisiatiewe.

Alle wenner is deur die plaaslike gemeenskap genomineer en verkies, en is daardeer vereer en erken vir die werk, tyd en moeite wat hulle vrylik aan die mense op die Weskus toegewy het. PP

Bevrediging van inwoners se behoeftes

Van 8 tot 10 Junie is 'n behoeftapeiling in Paternoster onderneem om die nuwe behoeftes van die gemeenskap te identifiseer, sowel as om kennis te neem van behoeftes waaraan daar reeds voldoen is.

Die assessorering is deur Janette du Toit en Cindy Jacobs onderneem en deur die Paternoster Project NPC befonds. Janette is die direkteur van Human Nature – 'n maatskappy in Kaapstad wat idees vir sosio-ekonomiese en omgewingsvolhoubaarheid ontwikkel – en Cindy is een van die spanlede. Hierdie behoeftapeiling bou voort op die uitstaande werk van Paternoster Vissery, wat 'n lewensbestaansassessorering befonds het. Dié assessorering het 'n reeks werkswinkels met die vissersgemeenskap en familielede behels en het daartoe gelei dat baie van die gemeenskap se behoeftes bevredig is. 'n Verslag oor hierdie assessorering gaan binnekort saamgestel en aan die gemeenskap en plaaslike besighede beskikbaar gestel word.

Die behoeftapeiling gaan ook deel vorm van die agenda van die tweede Paternoster Project NPC-konferensie wat later vanjaar gaan plaasvind. Die eerste konferensie het in Oktober 2017 plaasgevind en is bygewoon deur verteenwoordigers van Duitse universiteite, die Universiteit Stellenbosch, die Wes-Kaapse Onderwysdepartement en plaaslike besighede, entrepreneurs en opvoeders.

Paternoster Project NPC bedank elke lid van die gemeenskap wat deelgeneem het aan die behoeftapeiling. Ons sien daarna uit om saam met die mense van Paternoster te werk en te help om aan die gemeenskapsbehoeftes wat hulle geïdentifiseer het, te voorsien. **PP**

Die stories agter die stories

Dr Seuss het geweet waarvan hy praat toe hy dié raad gegee het: "You're never too old, too wacky, too wild, To pick up a book and read to a child."

Dis presies wat ons hier op Paternoster doen. Elke Donderdagmiddag is dit Storiehoek en lees vrywilligers uit die dorp saam met die Stigting se Duitse vrywilligers stories vir die kinders van St Augustine's Primêre Skool.

Dis iets om te beleef – die gretigheid waarmee die kinders boeke vir lees uitsoek en die selfvertroue waarmee hulle self ook hardop stories in Afrikaans én Engels vir hul maats voorlees.

Ons klein biblioteek in die skeepshouer met sy vrolik geverfde buitemure daar op die skoolgrond groei stadig maar seker aan. Danksy skenkings van boeke en kontant vir die aankoop van boeke, kan ons kinders die jongste boeke lees, sowel as mooi nuwe uitgawes van klassieke verhale – boeke wat ons net soveel soos die kinders geniet.

Die stories wat ons lees sluit gunstelinge soos *Die klein kaptein*, *Liewe Heksie* en *Babalela in*, en ook splinternuwe treffers van skrywers soos Jaco Jacobs en Marita van der Vyver. Deur boeke soos dié van Riana Scheepers wat 'n ruk op Paternoster gebly het, word ons kinders bewus gemaak van die ryk kultuur en natuurlewe van ons eie dorpie. Boeke soos *Stories Gogo Told Me* doen dieselfde wat betrek die verskeidenheid kulture van ons vasteland.

Klein verrassings sorg dat Storiehoek nie vervelig word nie. Rita van den Heever, bekend aan televisiekijkers, het 'n slag kom kuier en die kinders aan haar lippe laat hang met gedeeltes uit *Charlie en die sjokoladefabriek*. En toe ons op 'n keer in 'n kring sit en beurtelik om hardop te lees, laat Duitse vrywilliger Cathy Kwiatkowski die kinders met nuwe oë na haar kyk toe sy haar deel in vlot Afrikaans voorlees.

Vir die personeel van St Augustine's Primêre Skool is dit net so belangrik dat kinders 'n liefde vir lees aankweek. Op uitnodiging van die skoolhoof, mev Celestine Barends, lees 'n paar van ons vrywilligers ook in die laaste halfuur van die skooldag stories vir die graad 1- en 2-leerders.

As jy so na die klompie kyk wat grootog na die verhale sit en luister, weet jy dat jy met elke voorlesing veel meer as net 'n storie gee. Jy gee 'n verbeeldingsvlug, 'n reis, ervarings, nuwe woorde, vreemde wêrelde, 'n begrip vir die lewe. Jy gee van jou eie liefde vir lees en ontvang weer iets van die verwondering van jou kindertyd terug.

Dis mos nooit te laat om jou kindertjare van vooraf oor te hê nie!

Educare is 20 jaar oud

Paternoster Educare verander vir die afgelope 20 jaar kinders en ouers se lewens. Die crèche laat ouers toe om werk toe te gaan met die wete dat hulle kinders deur opgeleide mense versorg word.

Paternoster Educare het in 1998 begin met slegs drie onderwysers en 50 kinders. Die stigter, Nathalie van der Heever, sê: "Ons het R30 per week betaal om die Solomon Tollman Gemeenskapsaal te huur en ouers het R25 per week betaal. Ons het die kinders gevoer en gebad voordat hulle huis toe is, sodat hulle reg is vir bed. Verskillende besighede en plaaslike mense het vleis en groente geskenk vir die kinders om te eet, en ek het die pap en rys gekoop. Dit is hoe dinge gewerk het." Nathalie sê die personeel het dikwels nie betaling ontvang nie, maar die kinders het gehad wat hulle nodig gehad het. Die fasiliteit het beteken dat ouers kon gaan werk met die wete dat hul kinders veilig is.

Vandag versorg Paternoster Educare 82 kinders – van pasgebore babas tot sesjariges. "Ons het vyf gekwalifiseerde onderwysers en 'n prinsipaal, Rachel Cloete," sê Nathalie. "Elke klas het ook 'n vrywillige assistent en daar is 'n kok wat die maaltye voorberei. Hy/sy werk vir vyf dae 'n week, maar word slegs betaal vir twee dae, aangesien dit al is wat ons befondsing toelaat."

Die dagsorg het uiteindelik Educare geword en in 2006 na die huidige ligging langs die gemeenskapsaal geskuif. Verlede jaar het André Kleynhans toe 'n groot fasiliteit vir die pasgeborenes gebou. "Ons het dit André se Nessie genoem om vir André erkenning te gee vir die feit dat hy dit gebou het en gratis vir ons gegee het. Dit is pragtig. Ons volgende mikpunt is 'n sandput en tuin vir die speelgrond, en nuwe matte in die klaskamers vir die kinders om op te speel. Ons sal enige bydraes tot hierdie projek baie waardeer."

Nathalie sê dat die afgelope 20 jaar 'n voortdurende groeiopproses was, maar dat dit uit en uit die moeite werd was, alhoewel befondsing altyd in hulle agterkoppe is. "Ek dek gereeld van die uitgawes uit my eie huishoudelike begroting en ons moet elke jaar fondse insamel om die rekenmeester te betaal," sê sy. "Maar ons doen dit vir die kinders, want dan kan hulle ouers werk en hul gesinne onderhou."

Die meeste kinders wat by die oorspronklike dagsorg was, het reeds gematrikuleer, drie is nou vissermanne en 'n hele paar is universiteit en kollege toe. Vandag woon van hulle kinders Paternoster Educare by – en so word die kringloop voltooi. **PP**

Paternoster se kinders leer van plaaslike erfenis

Avonturier Dean Swart stap die hele kusroete van Suid-Afrika en Mosambiek – amper 6 000 km – om bewustheid oor seebewaring en -besoedeling te skep. Sy reis het op 31 Januarie in Alexanderbaai, op die Namibiese grens, begin en hy is van plan om vir die volgende twee jaar te stap. Op pad praat Swart by skole en met mense oor hul plaaslike erfenis en die belangrikheid van seebewaring en -beskerming.

Terwyl hy in Paternoster was, nadat hy reeds 640 km sonder enige bystand gestap het, het Swart by St Augustine's Primêr Skool vir meer as 200 leerders verduidelik dat hulle 'n rol daarin kan speel om die see teen besoedeling te beskerm. "Ek wil graag hê my reis moet mense inspireer," het hy gesê. "Selfs al kry net 'n handjievol mense die boodskap, is dit die moeite werd. Die kuslyn en seelewe is ons erfenis en dit moet beskerm word."

Swart, wat homself befonds en net 'n klein rugtas saam met hom dra, stap gemiddeld 20 km per dag en sê: "Ek wil hê kinders en volwassenes moet oor seebewaring en -besoedeling begin praat. Dit is 'n belangrike deel van ons toekoms." Swart het die mense van Paternoster bedank vir hul gasvryheid en vrygewigheid.

Vrywilligershuis verrys uit sand

Sodra dit voltooi is, gaan die vrywilligershuis die erfenis en omgewing van Paternoster weerspieël. Argitek Heini van Niekerk verduidelik hoe hy hierdie aspekte in die ontwerp van die huis geïnkorporeer het, terwyl die dorp die vordering met groot afwagting dophou.

Hoe het die huis se ontwerp ontstaan?

Die ruimtes het getransformeerd soos ons terugvoer uit verskeie werkswinkels en van die gemeenskap gekry het. Die gevolg was die toevoeging van 'n addisionele gemeenskapskoffiewinkel, 'n raadskamer, administratiewe ruimtes vir onderwysers, stoorpolek vir opvoedkundige toerusting en openbare ablusefasilitete, sowel as privaat leefareas en slaapkamers. Daar is ook stil hoekies om heen te ontsnap.

Hoe reflektereer die huis die plaaslike erfenis, grondstowwe of kultuur?

As plaaslike argitek het ek besluit om navorsing te doen en na historiese foto's uit argiewe van ouer as 110 jaar gekyk. Ek ontdek toe 'n verlore gewelvorm wat in die verlede by solderkamers met rietdakke voorgekom het. Hierdie gewelvorm is in die ontwerp ingewerk as eerbetoning aan ons verlore argitektoniese erfenis.

Nog 'n bevinding was dat die geboue destyds baie na aan mekaar opgerig is, met smal stegies tussen die geboue en gewels. Hierdie aspek is ook geïnkorporeer. Die huis word gebou uit plaaslik-ontginde klip en gaan inpass by die omliggende landskap met die groot skoorstene, rietdakke en wit mure wat deel is van die kultuur van Paternoster.

Wat is uniek omtrent die projekspan van die vrywilligershuis?

Almal wat betrokke is, is besonder toegewy. Die plaaslike span is nog altyd baie passievol oor die area en die maatskaplike vooruitgang, ten spyte van die intrinsieke uitdagings. Met die internasionale element glo hierdie wonderlike span dat hulle besluite en aksies 'n groot impak op die toekoms van Paternoster se kinders sal hé.

Watter argitektoniese uitdagings bied die erf en huis?

Die grootste uitdagings was die styl helling, die streng hoogtebeperkings en die bestaande rotsformasies. Dit het 'n noemenswaardige uitdaging vir die ontwerp en begroting gebied. Grootse grondwerk beïnvloed ook dikwels grondstabiliteit en wateraflooppatrone, maar ons het die struikelblokke oorkom. Die huis oorkant die pad en die vissermanne se uitkykpunt (wat ek nog uit my kinderde onthou) het verdere beperkings gestel.


Wat is jou vooruitsigte vir die bewoning van die huis?

Die huis bestaan uit 'n openbare, 'n semi-private en 'n private deel. Hoe verder jy in die gebou in beweeg, hoe meer gedefinieerd, maar tog minder gekontroleerd, word die ruimte. Die vloerplan is naatloos met die eksterne landskap geïntegreer en dit vul mekaar aan.

Is jy verbaas oor al die aandag wat die huis kry?

Aanvanklik ja, maar as jy daaroor nadink, maak dit sin. Wanneer sekere dinge in die lewe vir die regte redes gedoen word, kom mense bymekaar as 'n uitbeelding van menslike integriteit en karakter.

Werk jy slegs plaaslik?


Ja, want dit laat minder ruimte vir misverstande. Ek het in Vredenburg skoolgegaan, in Kaapstad en Londen argitektuur studeer en uiteindelik weer na die Weskus teruggekeer.

Hoe is jy persoonlik betrokke by hierdie huis?

Argitektuur word iets groots wanneer jy werklik die menslike aard in die geheel begin verstaan.
